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TICAD

(Tokyo International Conference on African Development)

- From TICAD I(1993) to TICAD V(2013),
every 5 years in Japan.
Since TICAD V,
every 3 years alternately in Japan and Africa.
- Co-organizer: Japan, World Bank, UNDP, UN, African Union Commission (AUC).
- TICAD VI (Nairobi, Kenya),
over 11,000 people, 53 African countries attended.

Uniqueness of TICAD

- Open and inclusive forum
- Engagement of multiple stakeholders
- Alignment with Africa's own agenda
- Emphasis on human security and people-centered development
- Effective implementation with integrated Follow up mechanisms

- Destinations: Nigeria, Ghana, Senegal and Cameroon
- September 13-25, 2008
- 51 participants, 18 participating companies

Mission in Central/Western Africa (2013)

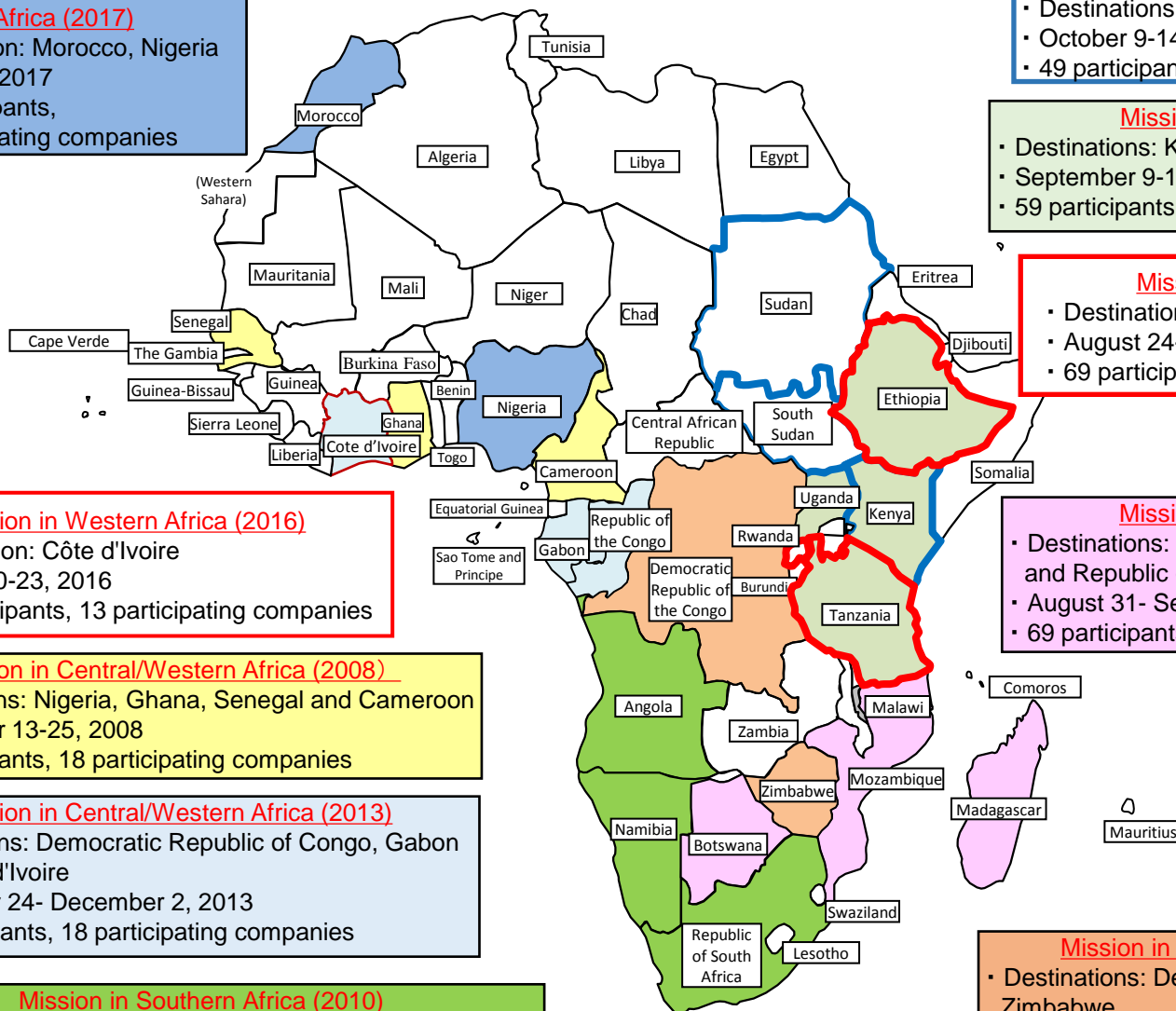
- Destinations: Democratic Republic of Congo, Gabon and Côte d'Ivoire

Mission in Southern Central Africa (2012)

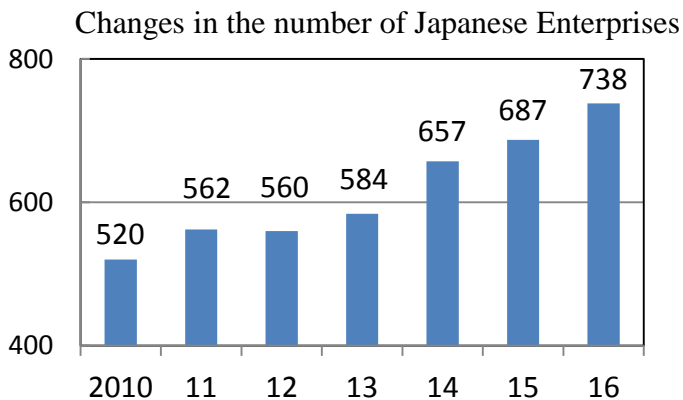
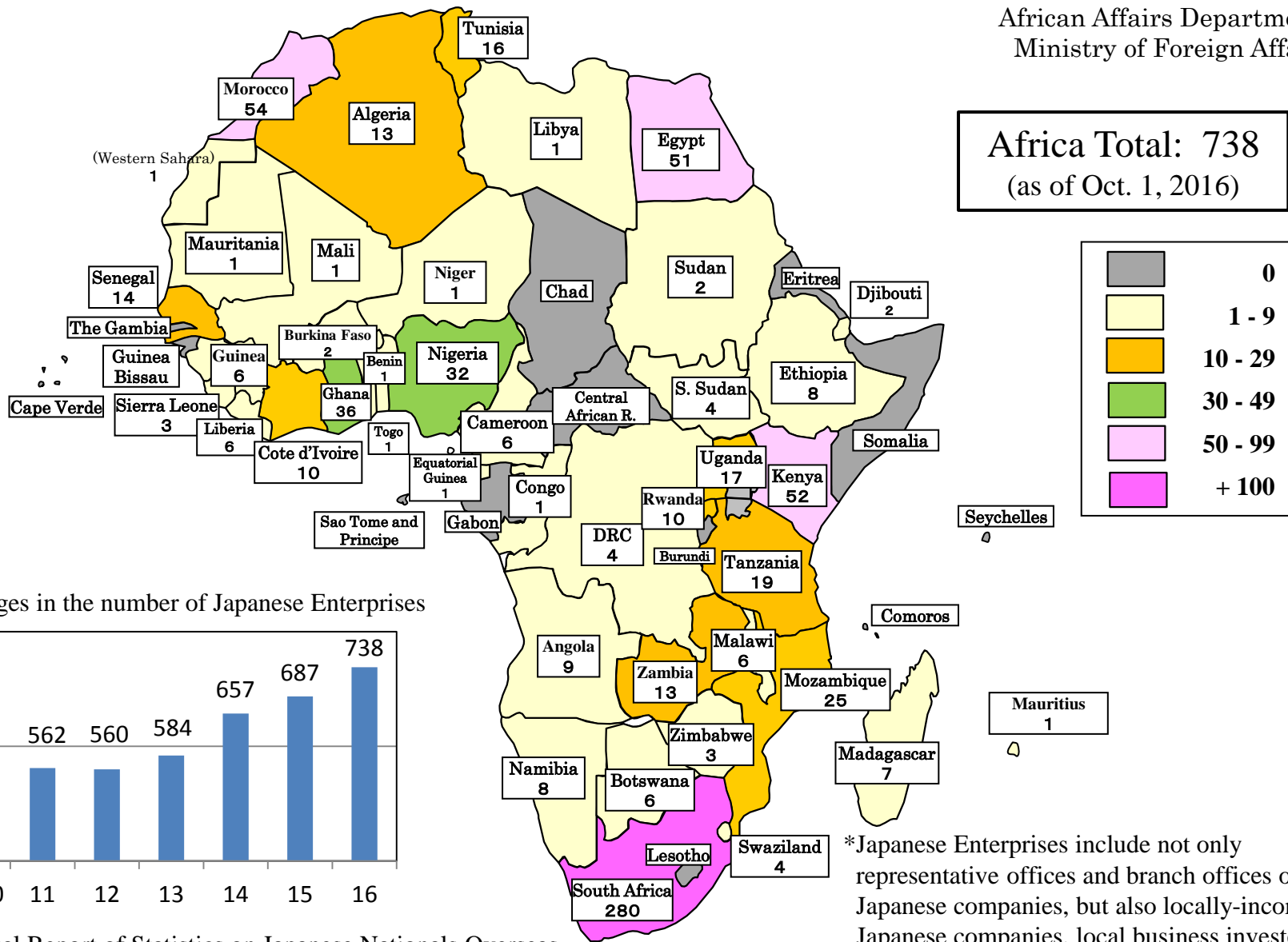
- Destinations: Democratic Republic of Congo and Zimbabwe
